Elder of New York and Tryon, who is spending a month here showed us today some interesting gold coins made a hundred years ago in Rutherford county by the Bechtler brothers, Augusta and Christopher. Mr. Elder discovered these valuable coins in New York and he plans to go to Rutherfordton in a few days and try to buy some more. Polk county was a part of Rutherford when the coins were made and no doubt a lot of these coins are in the possession of natives who received them from grandparents. The coins are well executed for the time and bear the names of the Bechtlers and some of them have Rutherford on them. Only one coin had the actual date and that was Aug. 1, 1834. Mr. Elder is a prominent numismatist of New York.
