Mills Gap Road May Be Reopened By Next Tuesday

The six-mile stretch between the South Pácolet River and the North Carolina state line on the Mills Gap Road, now being resurfaced, should be reopened to traffic by next Tuesday, R. C. White, superintendent of the county highway maintenance office, said last night.

Mr. White said that although hardly a mile had been resurfaced thus far, good weather would enable the job to be completed by the first of next week.

While a detour has been provided, motorists going to Mill Spring, N. C., have been advised to go by way of Landrum and Tryon.—Spartanburg Herald.
