June 27 Last Day to File Applications With the HOLC

Home owners who are involuntarily in default on their mortgages are again warned by the Home Owners' Loan Corporation that June 27th is the last day for filing new applications.

Under the law as recently passed by Congress, there was a 30 day extension granted for the receipt of new applications. The general tests of eligibility apply to all newly filed applications as well as those pending in the offices of the Corporation. As a general rule, the applicant must have been involuntarily in default on his mortgage on June 13, 1933, unless a default occurring is shown to have resulted from unemployment or other misfortune beyond the control of the applicant. The Corporation was created to protect honest home owners who are in temporary difficulty and not to offer lower interest rates to mortgagors, or to save lenders from past mistakes of judgment in making excessive loans.

The Asheville District Office will remain open until midnight, June 27th, to receive all applications.
