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R. C. Remick Killed In Auto Wreck

Royal C. Remick, 61, promoter of the Hogback Mt. resort and a resident of Tryon for a number of years, was killed in an auto accident Monday afternoon on a slippery road near Beltsville, Md.

Clippings from a Washington, D. C., newspaper state:

Remick, member of a prominent Michigan family, was the Washington representative of the Youngstown Steel and Stamping Co. He had homes in Tryon and Wilmington, N. C., Charleston, S. C., and Charlottesville, Va.

He figured prominently in the so-called "lobby investigation" that broke around the War Department in February, 1934. As representative of the Bec Tire Co., he told the House Military Affairs Committee that there were "irregularities" in the War Department's methods of awarding contracts for motor trucks and other supplies.

Last May Remick appeared before an Army court martial board and testified in behalf of Col. Alexander E. Williams. Later Col. Williams was sentenced to be dismissed from the Army after being found guilty of soliciting and obtaining a loan of \$2,500 from the representative of an automobile tube concern interested in War Department contracts.

Remick died at Casualty Hospital of a fractured skull and internal injuries.

Mr. Remick was born in Detroit, Mich., in December, 1874. He took an engineering course at the University of Michigan, and then became a partner in a lumber ex-

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Miss Rachel Jackson Wins Highest Beta Club Honor in State

In North Carolina thirty-five clubs, representing some of the largest high schools in the state, entered the contest. Miss Jackson made a grade five points higher than the closest competitor.

Beta Club members are chosen from Juniors and Seniors of the various high schools, these members must have the highest scholastic record in the class. This record must be maintained thru-out their membership in the club.

The purpose of the Beta Club is the promotion of scholastic excellence among high school students; the inculcating of cultural ambition in the members; and the instilling of the ideals of loyalty, courage, honesty, and integrity in the members in their relation with their fellow students and with their teachers.
