## Truck Driver Held Up by Four Robbers

Four highwaymen operating a Chevrolet truck and a Ford V-8 held up a Convoy Trucking Co., driver of Charlotte near Blacksburg, S. C., about 8 o'clock Wednesday night. They handcuffed the driver and locked him in the back of the big steel truck after they had taken a large quantity of cigarettes. Some of the tobacco merchandise was left on the road near Landrum. The men then painted off with green paint the name of the trucking firm and drove the big truck on to Tryon where they left it on the highway between W. Y. Wilkins' home and the Erskine rock bridge. The handcuffed driver was able to locate a wrench in the truck and managed to break open the door with it about 2:30 this morning. He immediately went to Mr. Wilkins' home and telephoned headquarters in Charlotte. No trace of the men had been found at time of going to press.
