## JOINS RANKS WITH ENGLAND

Geneva, Sept. 13.—Premier Laval of France today placed France in the ranks with Great Britain, Russia, and the smaller nations of Europe in defense of the peace obligations of the League of Nations covenant.

"Our obligations are inscribed in the covenant," Laval told the League of Nations assembly. "France will not evade those obligations."

(An Italian government spokesman in Rome stated that what Laval said was neither favorable nor unfavorable to Italy and that it would have no effect upon Italy's course of action).

To this French stand opposed to the imminent war between Italy and Ethiopia was added a warning by the delegate from Great Britain's dominion of South Africa that an Italian invasion of Ethiopia might lead to racial trouble between the blacks and whites. —Asheville Times.
