SOIL CONSERVATION AS-SOCIATION ORGANIZED

At a meeting at the courthouse Monday afternoon the Polk County Soil Conservation Association was organized. The following men were elected as directors for the ensuing year: C. A. Jolley, J. H. Gibbs, S. J. Fagan, J. M. Powell, J. Solon Williams and J. A. Wilson and W. D. Westbrook. From these directors the officers will be elected.

The Association already has 25 members. Members of this organization are eligible to sign agreements with the CCC camp officials and secure their aid in planning and controlling soil ero-

sion.

Any farmer within a 25 mile radius of the camp at Spindale is eligible to join this Association and get the services of this camp. This can be done by signing the articles of the association at the county agent's office.
