Arrests for failure to have one's dogs vaccinated against rabies as required by the new state law will sort after October 1, rabies inspectors announced yesterday.

A check-up has revealed that hundreds of dog owners have not yet complied with the law. Dogs may be vaccinated either by private veterinaries or by the inspector. In the latter case, the fees is 50 cents.—Asheville Citizen.

Raleigh, Sept. 24.—Officials of the Employment Services of the United States and Canada gather in Asheville next week to discuss the problems of unemployment, other related problems and unemployment compensation they affect the Employment Services, Mrs. May Thompson Evans, Director of the N. C., State Employment Service, stated here today as she announced the conven-ing of the 23rd Annual Conven-tion of the International Associa-tion of Public Employment Ser-vices in Asheville next week. Over two hundred and fifty Employment Service officials from Washington, each of the forty-eight States and Canada, will register at the convention headquarters in Asheville on Thursday and Friday, October 3rd and 4th. This convention will be followed by the National Conference of Directors of State Employment Services on October 6th through the 9th.
