Tryon Bank Shows Splendid Progress

The statement of the Tryon Bank & Trust Co., published in Wednesday's Tryon Daily Bulletin was a revelation of the tremendous growth the local bank is enjoying. The resources of the bank have increased over \$100,000 within the past six months. The June statement showed total resources at \$429,000. The report on January 1 showed over \$540,000. Washington, Jan. 2.—Rep. Robert F. Rich, (R., Pa.) threatened today to object to the program calling for President Roosevelt to deliver his message to congress tomorrow night.
