Public Meeting at Parish Hall Tonight

A number of out of town people of prominence have been invited to the public meeting to be held tonight at 8 o'clock at the Parish House for the purpose of organizing a movement to secure the segregation of first offender criminals under 21 from the hardened criminals.

All the civic organizations and women's clubs of the community are invited to participate in the movement and express their views on the subject.

The final goal of the movement is to save as many young men as possible from a life of crime and misery and to help them re-establish themselves as worthwhile citizens. Judge Pless and other officials have endorsed the movement as one of the best solutions toward reducing crime in this country and plans are underway to extend the movement throughout the state.

Every man and woman interested is invited to attend the meeting tonight at 8 o'clock at the Parish House.
