A BIG SLIDE ON RAILROAD

A big slide from the mountain fell on the railroad track just below Melrose on Wednesday night about 10:30. A freight train soon afterwards ran into it and did considerable damage to two wooden box cars and also some damage to the engine. The fireman was slightly injured when he jumped from the cab. None of the cars jumped the track but the force of the collision was so great that it smashed the two wooden cars together. Wrecking crews from all directions were rushed to the scene to clear the track as soon as possible. The track was expected to be open by this evening, although a snow storm raged all night Thursday. Passengers were transferred by bus between Tryon and Saluda.
