Mrs. J. T. Camp Passes

Mrs. J. T. Camp, 66, Polk county's most prominent farm woman, died Sunday morning about 10 o'clock from heart trouble at her home, Sleepy Hollow, in Green Creek township.

Funeral arrangements are pending the arrival of several children from distant points.

Mrs. Camp was well-known for her progressive interest in all affairs for the betterment of Polk county and life on the farm. She was a director of the Farmers Federation at Tryon and a leader in community work. She was a daughter of the late Rev. Millner Jones, pioneer Episcopal missionary for the mountain section who came to Tryon from Texas when Mrs. Camp was a little girl.

The deceased is survived by her husband and eight children.
