GIRL SCOUT BIRTHDAY

March 12-18 is national Girl Scout Birthday Week. Thursday, March 12, will be observed throughout the nation by more than 280,000 Girl Scouts as Girl Scout Birthday. This day has been designated as the official birthday of the Girl Scout organization in the United States because Juliette Low of Savannah, Ga. established the first troop of Girl Scouts in America in her home city on this date.

Mrs. Low was so delighted with the progress of Girl Scouting in Savannah that she decided to launch a national Girl Scout organization. Through her efforts the movement has grown steadily until there are more than 375,000 Girl Scouts, captains, lieutenant leaders, local council members, and troop committee members affiliated with the organization.
