## This Month's Garden

These showery days must taken advantage of for any lastminute planting that has to be done, to fill in bare spaces in the border. Continuous perennial bloom in a small garden is an impossible dream, even if we had no droughts or heat waves to consider; but now is a good time to take note of one's more conspicious failures in planning. For instance, deffodils should never be planted in the main border, unless among plants of sufficiently robust growth to completely hide their decaying foliage and the bare spot left by They will do their dying down. very well along the margin of the woods when properly planted and fertilized, and will not be in the way afterwards. Tulips are better taken up as soon as their foliage turns yellow, especially if in a border that will be frequently watered during the summer. This is a rather troublesome operation where the planting is thick, but the tulips need to dry out, and the necessary stirring of the ground is helpful to the plants left in the border.

Annuals used just "to fill in" will not be as fine as if they had a bed to themselves and plenty of room to spr ad out; but a bed given up to annuals alone will be vacant too much of the year to be allowed a conspicious position in the garden.

You will add very much to the tidy and prosperous look of your border if you keep the edge planted with low-growing plants of evergreen and attractive foliage, like the rock pinks and the more compact types of creeping phlox.
