M. C. Gosnell, 83, Passes Suddenly

Chesnee, June 25.—M. C. Gosnell, 83, a native and life-long resident of the Green Creek section of Polk county, died at his home this morning when stricken at the breakfast table.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Big Level Baptist church in the upper part of Polk county. The Rev. Henry Allman will officiate. Interment will be in the adjoining cemetery.

Blackwell, Greer, Route 2, and Mrs. Lee Cochran, Inman, Route 3; and a brother, Bill Gosnell, Mill Spring, N. C. Fifty-three grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren also survive.
