Funeral services for one of Tryon's most beloved citizens, John Orr, who passed away Saturday afternoon at the age of 94 following several days illness, will be held this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at the Erskine Memorial Congregational church with the pastor, Dr. C. Arthur Lincoln, officiating assisted by the Rev. C. P. Burnett, rector of the Church of the Holy Cross, Episcopal.

Mr. Orr was born in Lowell, Mass., in 1842 of Scotch parentage. In his youth he was employed in Clinton, Mass., as a building engineer, but came south 52 years ago as the construction engineer of the American Missionary association. He had made his home in Tryon for the past 40 years with his wife, the former Miss Alice Topping. For 20 years he was a well known business man here, always active in church life and in supporting worthy causes. He acted as superintendent of the Erskine Memorial Sunday school here for more than 20 years, and was influential in the upbuilding
