Dr. E. M. Gwathmey, president of Converse college, will speak at the first assembly period of the new term of the Landrum public schools Tuesday at 10 a. m.

Three persons, all residents of Anderson county, S. C. were drowned in Lake Summit, near Tuxedo, Sunday afternoon when the 16-foot motorboat in which they were riding overturned. The dead are: Fate Black, 50 years old, Fate Black, Jr. 9 years old and Thomas Martin.

It is estimated that 21,000,000 automobiles took to the highways this week-end in celebration of the Labor Day holidays. All the banks and post offices in the nation closed in observance of the day.
