Detroit Orchestra Leader Passed Away on Monday

Ossip Gabrilowitsch, director since 1918 of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, died on Monday morning after an illness of several menths. Public funeral services were held Wednesday. The great director, who was also a composer and lecturer, was born 58 years ago at St. Petersburg, now Leninggrad, Russia. He was one of this country's most noted musicians, and the many Detroiters living in Tryon will regret his passing. He married Clara Clemens, daughter of the late "Mark Twain" in 1908.
