Gastonia, N. C., Oct. 26.—Officiels of the Piedmont Council Boy Scouts of America, Inc., have just acquired a tract of land at Lake Lanier adjoining the Piedmont Boy Scout Como which will provide thirty-two additional acres of beautiful mountain lands to ine camp.
