Our First Russian Letter

We have had many communications from foreign countries, but the following letter from Fred McLaughlin is the first that we have received from Russia and it gives his first-hand impressions of that large country:

November 12, 1936.

Dear Seth:

So many different opinions are current in America concerning Russia that my impressions of the Soviet may interest a few of the Bulletin readers.
