Saluda, Feb. 20.—Since William Morris' return to his mountain cove home near here from New York City where he told a nationwide radio audience of his long vigil in guarding the century-old fire in his home, things are not as lonesome as they used to be.

Last week, the manufacturers of Philco radios had a modern radio installed in Mr. Morris' cabin and he now able to contact the outside world.

The postman, who formerly passed by the Morris cabin, now stops each day with scores of letters from all sections of the United States written by persons who heard Mr. Morris on the radio several weeks ago.

Relatives, long forgotten by Mr. Morris, have communicated with him and want to keep the fire burning when he dies. The Morris cabin and yard are thronged with persons who visit the place to see the fire.
