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David Niven Writes About Hollywood

David Niven, Tryon's popular movie actor, and correspondent for the world's smallest daily newspaper, writes his second interesting Hollywood letter to the Bulletin. Mr. Niven is appearing in "The Charge of the Light Brigade" today and Tuesday at the Tryon Theatre. This picture was first shown in Tryon last fall to a large audience while Mr. Niven was in Tryon as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. F. B. Flynn. His letter is as follows:

Hollywood

2nd March.
Dear Seth,

I am afraid the Hollywood Letter has become almost a myth by this time, but don't give up hope yet! I am starting "Prisoners of Zenda" on Monday and am naturally in a flat spin getting everything ready for the "Super-Special-all-talking-all-fighting-all-galloping-all-gripping-all prisoner and very little Zenda-Production."
