MEETING HUMAN NEEDS

The Polk County Chapter of the Red Cross and the Polk County Helping Hand met on Tuesday of this week for reports on work accomplished and consideration of work to be done. The treasurer of the Red Cross, J. B. Hester, stated that \$1,624.87 had been sent to National headquarters for flood relief, an amount more than eight times greater than original quota for Polk county. In addition a large quantity of suitable clothing was forwarded to the flooded areas by the local chapter working in conjunction with the Kiwanis club. Many cases of emergency need in Polk county were met during the winter by the Home Service Chairman, George Cathey.

The Case Committee of the Helping Hand society reported cooperation with Miss Rebecca Hoskins, the County Welfare Worker, in several of the two hundred cases under her care. Because of limited funds, the Helping Hand can assist in the most urgent cases only. The intimate nature of such work precludes its publication; but, without the aid given-by the Helping Hand, some families would be in desperate plight.
