

The nine months term is important if parents want their children to have as good an oppor. tunity to get an education and be as well prepared as children in other similiar communities. It is important if they want new citizens to come here to help build the community; for many people go to a community because of good schools. Nine months is the shortest time in which it is possible to do a standard year of school work for average students. Textbooks, college entrance requirements and teacher training are all based upon nine months term. A shorter period hurts the school pupil. The polls will be open Tuesday morning at sunrise and close at sunset.
