Robert S. Smith escaped convict, and suspected of killing a Lancas. ter (S. C.) policeman, and who fled to Cooper's Gap, this county, Sunday a week ago where he abandoned a stolen car and hired Dan Ledbetter of that section to take him to Biltmore, was captured Tuesday night near Conway, S. C., after a 30-mile chase from officers. Lieut. Leo Jenkins, who came to Polk county last Sunday and took pictures of fingerprints on the car stated that they corresponded to Smith's and that Smith did not deny that he was the man wanted. He left Polk county in company with a woman companion.
