Town Manager C. H. Helms States that the \$18,000.00 WPA sewerage project for the Town of Tryon will be completed this week at a total cost to the town of about \$6,000.00. By doing the work at this time with Federal Government co-operation the town has saved \$12,000.00 and has greatly improved the sanitary condition of the community.

4-H Booth at State Fair Won \$40.00

Five counties in the state were asked to put on special educational exhibits in the 4-H department at the State Fair October 12—. The booths were to show some of the more important phases of the program of 4-H club work, as it is conducted in the various counties in North Carolina, in the training of farm youth in the Art of Living.

Polk county was asked to put on an exhibit on Recreation, demonstrating the different types of recreation in the home and community. The booth was divided into three divisions, outdoor, community, and home recreation, and was illustrated by miniature figures made of pipe cleaners. The heads were made by mixing equal parts of flour and salt and baked in a very slow oven.

The faces were painted on with colors and the figures dressed in crepe paper costumes. The types of recreation demonstrated were basketball, tennis, hiking, horse-shoe, picnicing, camping, swimming several games as Virginia Reed, Come Let Us Be Joyful, Maypole and Circle games. Home recreation included reading, music, radio, singing, hobbies of different kinds and table games.
