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Senator F. P. Bacon Named Chairman, Hoey's Committee

Raleigh, Nov. 22.—The Governor's Hospitality Committee has been expanded to include every county in North Carolina as a result of the appointment by Governor Clyde R. Hoey of 100 county chairmen, who in turn will appoint the members of the county hospitality committees. F. P. Bacon was appointed chairman of the Polk county committee.

Each county hospitality committee will cooperate with the Governor's Hospitality Committee, which is composed of all the members of the State Board of Conservation and Development, in attempting to arouse a greater degree of interest among the people of the state in showing real North Carolina hospitality to all who come here from other states, either as tourists or permanent residents.

Governor Hoey and those who have been cooperating with him in the state advertising campaign, are convinced that the state should do everything possible to induce visitors to return to the state again and again and that they will not become "repeaters" unless the people they come in contact with while here the first time show a spirit of hospitality and friendliness.
