The projection booth and machines, the heating equipment and new lighting fixtures have all been put in, and Manager Nessmith states that just as soon as a message is received from Charlotte at noon he will advertise in today's Bulletin the name of the picture to be shown tonight.

The price of admission will be 15c and 25c.
