Tokyo, Jan. 17.—Premier Prince Fumimaro Konoye today was reported to have told Japanese political leaders frankly that the undeclared war against China was becoming increasingly grave.

Domei (Japanese new agency) said Konoye informed leading members of both houses of parliament that failures to bring China to terms had "compelled the government to resort to another course of serious nature." What this might mean was not disclosed.

It was learned authoritatively that yesterday's governmental statement on the new imperial policy had not disclosed the full scope of the decisions.
