Cannon Dies Of Injuries From Plane Accident Saturday

Aiken, S. C., Feb. 13.—J. W. Cannon, III, co-owner of an Orlando (Fla.) airport, and scion of the North Carolina textile family, died in a hospital here tonight from injuries he suffered in a plane crash 24 hours earlier.

The 21-year-old sportsman-flier's open cockpit monoplane was forced down near Barnwell, S. C., in a field. Cannon taxied the plane to a public road and in an attempt to take off swerved to miss a tree. He lost control and the plane nosedived 100 feet to the ground.
