Charles A. Aiken, Noted Artist, To Exhibit Here

Charles A. Aiken, prominent New York artist, will hold an exhibition of paintings at Mrs. B. King Couper's Rock House Art Gallery during March, beginning on Wednesday the 16th. The public is invited. Mr. Aiken is the treasurer and one of the founders of the internationally famous Fifteen Gallery of New York. He is a member of the Salmagundi club, New Haven Paint and Clay club, the New York Watercolor club, and the Allied Artists of America. His work is in the permanent collections of the Brooklyn Museum, the Worcester Art Museum, Dallas Museum of Fine Arts; at San Diego, Washington, Chicago, New Haven and Macon. He is represented by a portrait in the School of Fine Arts, Yale University. He received his artistic training in the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston and spent a year in Italy and France.

One of the most outstanding examples of his mural paintings being the decorations for the stage and lobby of Steinert Hall, Boston, installed in 1913-15.
