### Preview Today of Aiken Pictures

A private preview of the paintings of Chas. Aiken the artist, will be shown this afternoon at Mrs. B. King Couper's Rock House Art Gallery. These pictures have received much praise from critics all over the country. The Brook-

lvn Eagle said:

"Especially noted in the group are views of the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, which the artist has bainted from an unusual angle. They might be described as closeups of the subject and are painted looking down into the canyon from the summit. Curiously, in concentrating on this single aspect, the vastness of the subject is more convincingly presented than if the traditional panoramic composition had been attempted. Incidentally, the design and color of the rock stratas resolve themselves into fascinating abstract patterns.

"The flower still-life's also included in the exhibition, again evince the artist's sensitive appreciation of his subject, which a sure draftsmanship and a certain austerity of color and design prevent from becoming sweetened or sen-
