It is owned by the Adams Corp., of High Point. The officers are J. E. Millis, president and treasurer; H. D. Jobe, vice-president; and T. C. Langley, secretary and assistant treasurer, all of High Point. G. C. Farr, general manager, is now in Tryon supervising the work. A road has already been built to the location and actual work begun.
