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EMPLOYEES ADVISED TO SAFEGUARD SOCIAL SECURITY ACCOUNTS

In an effort to insure seasonal or part-time workers against the loss of any benefits which might accrue to their credit, Graham Martin, Manager of the Asheville field office of the Social Security Board, has issued the following suggestions for the guidance of employees:

1. Keep the name and address of each employer for whom you work, as well as the record of your own wage earnings, in every job you hold.

2. Make your account number known to every employer for whom you have worked since the last day of December 1936. Whatever wages or salary you may earn in any job, covered by the Act, after the last day of 1936 and before you reach the age of 65, (or die), should be credited to your social security account. The law requires each employer to report your wages so that you may get the full amount of benefits due you. If your employer does not know your number he cannot make a report that will assure a correct record of your wages.

3. You should have only one social security account number. If you lose your account card, ask your Social Security Board field office for a duplicate. Do not get a new number! If you have more than one number, keep the first one issued you, but send the other cards to the Manager of your Social Security Board field office to be cancelled. Tell him you are returning the extra numbers,
