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"Polk County, Columbus: Complete indexes of dockets, minute books, and other official records, dating from 1840 to 1935, in the office of the Clerk of the Court in Polk County. Work includes incidental refileing essential to the index. Sponsor will maintain records after the completion of the project. This project will operate in Columbus, Polk County. There is no normal budgetary appropriation for this work, and no regularly employed personnel will be displaced. In addition to projects specifically approved. Sponsor: Board of County Commissioners."

"Polk County, County-wide: Prepare and serve school lunches to be furnished without cost to needy or undernourished children in the public schools of Polk County. This project will operate throughout Polk County. In addition to projects specifically approved. Sponsor: Board of County Commissioners."

Storm at Charleston

Radio broadcasts at noon today announce that a severe tornado hit Charleston, S. C., early this morning, killing 25 people and injuring approximately 340. 36 city blocks were damaged including the Old Slave Market and the City Hall. Mayor Maybank was on a visit to Flat Rock, N. C., at the time of the storm, but left immediately for home upon receipt of the news Governor Johnston was visiting in Oklahoma. Lieut.-Gov. Harley hurried to the scene of the catastrophe. Upon orders of President Roosevelt, members of the Army and Navy, Marines and squads of CCC enrollees were rushed to the scene to render all possible aid to residents of the city affected by the storm. According to reports, the Red Cross is already on the scene and the injured and homeless are rapidly receiving assistance.
