## State Election Board Orders Saluda Count

The State Board of Elections meeting Tuesday in Raleigh heard the protest of defeated Republicans in Polk county charging irregularities in absentee voting and in tabulating the vote in Saluda precinct resulting in the loss of enough votes to have given the office of County Commissioner to Republican W. D. Westbrook instead of to Democrat E. G. Thompson. The State Board ordered the county officials to determine how many votes were cast in the precinct.

## Street Decorating Started Tuesday

The committee in charge of decorating Trade street with colored lights for the Christmas holidays began work on Tuesday Tom Costa, the chairman, aided by C. J. Lynch, the treasurer and others, have one electric pole near the Kell Furniture Co., into a Christmas tree design with pine greens. Other poles on down the street will receive similar treatment.
