Miss Frances De Villa Ball, whose musical program was so enthusiastically received by the members of the Lanier club, has been urged to enlarge upon her theme—The Story of Music—with illustrations on the piano, in a series of six evening recitals.

These interesting events will begin at the Lanier library on Tuesday evening, January 10th, and continue on the following Tuesdays up to February 14th.

Miss Ball, a pupil of Leschetizky, is a well-known pianist in New York State, and has spent several winters giving recitals and talks on musical appreciation in Florence, Italy. She not only has the three requisites for artistic performance on the piano, tone, touch and temperament, but in her talks, she shows an unusual ability for imparting her understanding of music to the lay mind.
