Hon. Carroll P. Rogers, representative from Polk county in the North Carolina General Assembly, writes interesting letter from Raleigh;

"Dear Seth:

"The meeting of the State Legislature is now in full swing. The committees of the House and Senate have been appointed, and the Legislative machinery of the State has begun to grind away. We are having delightful weather, and the past ten days have been as balmy as mid-winter days in Florida or Porto Rico. The first few days of the session were given over to the organization of the Legislature for its work, and to affairs of a social nature. On last Thursday the Governor held a reception, to which the members of the Legislature and their wives were invited guests. On Saturday night was held the Jackson Day dinner, at which A. B. (Happy) Chandler, Governor of Kentucky, was the guest speaker. This dinner was attended by over 300 Tar Heels, and was a most interesting occasion. On this morning (Wed.) Frances Perkins, Secretary of Tabor in the President's cabinet, addressed a joint session of both house. By the way, this is the first session of the Legislature in some years, in which the fair sex has no representation in either house of the State Legislature.
