Landrum Dentist Granted Pardon

Retiring Governor Olin D. Johnston of South Carolina extended executive clemency to 29 prisoners of the state yesterday (Tuesday) on his last day in office.

Among those who received pardons, paroles or commutations were Dr. R. H. Wilds of Landrum. Dr. Wilds was granted a full pardon after serving half of an 18 months sentence for embezzlement at Spartanburg in April 1938. Charges resulting in his conviction grew out of an alleged shortage in funds of the town of Landrum while Dr. Wilds served the town as clerk.

Constables C. R. Bradley and H. L. Wilson destroyed a large distilling plant in the Pea Ridge section and one in the Cooper's Gap township, near Lake Adger. A large quantity of beer and some whiskey was destroyed by the officers at each place.
