Rogers' Bill Is Given N. C. House Approval

Raleigh, Feb. 17.—The house today passed Representative Carroll P. Rogers' bill to provide for the election of the tax collector of Polk county by popular vote.

His measure would provide for the election of the tax collector at the 1940 election and biennially thereafter. It would require a \$10,000 bond and would fix the salary at \$1,800 a year.

The bill was given a favorable report yesterday by the house committee on election laws.—Asheville Citizen.
