Dear Mr. Vining—

The wedding of Miss Virginia Graham and Mr. Antony (No H!) Thesiger took place last Thursday, March 9th, at 2:30 p. m., in St. George's Church, Hanover Square, London. The bride looked lovely in a dress of white slipper satin with a wreath of white velvet ivy leaves on her head over a very full and billowy tulle veil. She carried a shower bouquet of white camelleas. She was followed up the aisle by four little girls and five small boys. The girls wore long sleeved yellow organdie dresses with full skirts to their ankles. White chiffon ruffles edged the necks and finished off the sleeves at the wrists. Deep misty blue moire ribbon made the wide sashes and a narrow version of the same colour was tied around the head of each little girl. They carried fat Victorian bunches of yellow primroses. The boys were in ribbed silk of the same yellow—suits of the Kate Greenaway period. So much for the clothes.

It was a fine sunny day and the church was full of friends wearing new spring hats. They were a gay collection and the general effect in St. Georges was very colourful.
