Free Celery Seeds Offered Farmers By Costa and Palmer

Polk county farmers desiring to grow celery this summer can get free seeds from Dr. M. C. Palmer and Tom Costa at the Tryon Fuel Supply. They must get these seeds within the next ten days or there may not be any left.

Mr. Costa will give instructions how to grow plants and then will buy the celery in the fall if the farmers desire to sell through him

The farmers will get the seeds free if they agree to plant and cultivate according to the following directions: Get a wooden box about 2 by 3 feet wide and 4 to 5 inches high. Fill the box for 3½ inches with good sifted, rich, sandy soil; pack soil tight with heavy wooden block so as to give a smooth even surface; now spread seeds on top of dirt; get some of same kind of soil and sprinkle over seeds until they are just barely covered. Now cover bed with sheet of newspaper; let paper cover dirt completely and bring the ends of paper up the sides of box so that paper forms a tray to hold a half inch of water allowing the water to gradually seep through paper to soil; corners of paper must be turned up to prevent water from running down the sides of box. Water once a day with half an inch of water. Keep the bed in the shade. In about three weeks when plants begin to show take paper off. Keep plants in shade; sprinkle water lightly every day so as not to disturb plants. When plants are
