Hendersonville Horse Show Opens Today

Hendersonville, July 26. — The ourth annual Hendersonville Horse Show, among the top-ranking attractions of the summer season in Western North Carolina, will begin its first performance at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Thursday night, Friday afternoon, and Friday night performances will follow.

Last year's record attendance at the four performances of 7,000 persons is expected to be surpassed this week, indications being that the 1939 event will be the most successful yet held.

"Everything points to the biggest and best show we have ever had here," H. B. Kelly, of Hendersonville and Tryon, general manager of the event, said Wednesday.

Some of the finest horses in this section of the country will be seen in the ring during the two-day vent. Among them will be several animals recently purchased by Greenville, S. C., parties that have never been shown in the South before.

The show again carries a North Carolina summer camp horsemanship championship and some of the finest camp riders will be seen in action. In addition, some of the South's leading child riders are exhibiting their own horses in the show.

Prize money this year is above \$1,000 and there will be above 150 individual entries, more than ever before. The number of classes, 46, is also larger than for previous events. Several additional hand—Continued on Back Page—
