Miss Peggy Litsey, who has been visiting her aunt, Mrs. P. W. Winn, has returned to her home in Savannah, Ga.

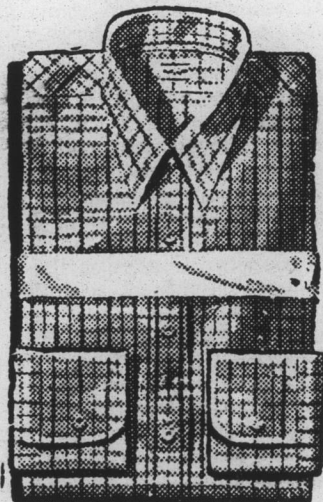
