## Pastoral Call Is Accepted By W. P. Jackson

The Rev. William Parkyn Jackson on Sunday accepted a call to serve as pastor of the First Congregational church of Asheville, succeeding the Rev. John Rea Chapman, who resigned some time ago.

Mr. Jackson, who was called at a special congregational meeting on December 20, announced his acceptance of the call at the 11 o'clock service at the church on Sunday.

Mr. Jackson has been serving as supply pastor of the church for the past two months. He and Mrs. Jackson have been living in Tryon for some time.

Mr. Jackson was born in Toronto, Canada, the son of a Congregational minister who was an American citizen. He was educated at the Collegiate institute, Kingston, McGill university and Canada Congregational college, Montreal, Canada.

Ordained in 1895, he served four parishes, the last one in St. Albans, Vt., where, after seven years, he resigned to become superintendent of a community club for young men and boys opened at his request in that city.

Soon after the United States entered the World War, he was called to represent the War department and Navy department commission on training camp activities outside the camps at Fort Niagara, N. Y., New London, Conn., and Camp Dix, N. J.

For more than 20 years following this war service, Mr. Jackson represented the National Recreation association in various capacities
