Green Re-Elected Chairman County Democrats

Dr. W. S. Green was re-elected chairman of the Polk County Democratic Executive Committee on Saturday at the first meeting of the re-organization on Saturday at Columbus. Mrs. Susan Craig of Saluda, vice-chairman; D. S. Blois, of Tryon, secretary.

The County Democratic convention which met at 2 p. m., in the Court House elected R. M. Hall as convention chairman and D. S. Blois as secretary.
