57 Houses Receiving Paint, Improvements

One of the biggest scale improvements made in Tryon within the past few weeks is the painting of 57 houses of the Southern Mercerizing Co., at Soumerco. Unlike many industrial communities the houses are not being painted the same color. They have that 57 variety look. Each home has its own setting on a hill, in a valley, beside a brook, or nestled in a cove and painted attractively to fit its surrounding. If it is a log house it is stained. There are tints of various shades. Many of the homes have flowers and other decorations. New roofs, porches, steps and other repairs are being made where needed. And all the homes without electricity are being wired for this modern convenience. On Tuesday a tour of farm women of the County visited the community and enjoyed a visit through the mercerizing mill.

BIG DIVIDENDS PAID LOCAL INVESTORS

Nearly \$4,000 was paid out in dividends this week to investors in the Tryon Federal Savings & Loan Association, according to an advertisement in Tuesday's Bulletin. The semi-annual dividends due on June 30th, but already in the mail represent a 4% return on an investment of approximately \$250,000 made by 149 people. Secretary M. R. McCown states that as small amount as \$1 is all that is necessary to start a saving account with the local institution.
