## TRYON HIGH 12; SPARTANBURG 0

The Tryon high gridders continued undefeated yesterday when they whipped a scrappy Spartanburg high squad composed of reserves of the varsity. The game was played in a drizzling rain which did not slow up the play as expected. During the first half the Tryon team struck twice to score two touchdowns and then coasted to victory keeping the visitors well in check and playing straight football. The first tally came when Jack Melton raced around end 47 yards to score. He was aided by excellent blocking of the backfield with Vining taking out two men alone. The second score was made when the ball was advanced from midfield by a succession of line plunges by Vining and D. Beatson to the three yard marker, where Dutton Beatson dived over.

The Tryon team showed improved form over their wet showing in the Marshall game with the play being more aggressive and polished. The play and blocking of the backfield was outstanding with Vining doing exceptionally well both on offense and defense, shifting in the line to strengthen the weakness caused by the absence of Homer Shields, out with a knee injury. Dutton Beatson played his best game of the year exhibiting time and again fancy broken field running, punting the wet ball consistently thirty and thirty-five yards and running the team well at quarterback.
