## Polk County Quota Of **Drafted Men Is 59**

Chairman Julian B. Hester of a Polk County Draft Board has Reived a letter from Governor Clyde R. Hoey, stating that the quota for Polk County in the selective draft is 59. Credit has already been given for those in the service, but does not include Franklin Little who was accepted last week. This will leave the quota at 58. About 16 men have volunteered, the latest being Robert Homer Slone, whose order number is 397. The first 25 order numbers were published last Saturday. Below is published an ad-ditional list. Between now and June 30th, 58 men will be selected for the draft service. If the first 58 are eligible no more will be called, but if exceptions are made more men will be called until the required quota is filled.
