A check for \$1500 has been sent by Mayor Missildine to the Chase National Bank in New York to be forwarded to Mrs. Ronald Tree in England, for the purchase of a Mobile Canteen, the gift of the people of Polk County to the people of England. The \$100 surplus will be given to the Tryon Workroom of the British War Relief Society for the purchase of warm garment material for the homeless. Once again the people of this community have demonstrated their sympathy for the suffering of their fellow man and have given expression to it in a practical sense for the Mobile Canteen fills an acute need; it can be rushed into the bombed areas to give hot food to the homeless, the fire fighters, rescue crews and emergency volunteers. Every man, woman and child who has contributed to its purchase has performed a great service for Britain in its critical hour and they can be content with the realization that the plaque inscribed "Donated by Tryon—Polk County, North Carolina, U.
